Family Connection Mark 10:35-45 (shorter form Mark 10:42-45)

In the daily routine of family life, power struggles seem unavoidable. Whenever two or more people live together, there will be occasions of disagreement and attempts to exert influence over each other. Today's Gospel can be an invitation to consider how authority is exercised in your household. There is a temptation to exercise our authority in ways that show our power over others. Especially when conflicts emerge, many of us rely upon the power we believe our role gives to us. Jesus teaches us that there is a more persuasive form of leadership. In these daily challenges we have the opportunity to practice and teach the kind of service and leadership Jesus modeled for us in his ministry and in his passion and death.

As you gather as a family, invite family members to participate in a role play in which family roles are reversed. For example, you might assign children the role of parents putting their children to bed with parents acting like the children. Or you may have them role play parents asking for cooperation from children to clean up the family room. When the role play is finished, ask if it was an accurate picture of how this situation usually plays out in your household. Does everyone cooperate when asked? What happens when someone doesn't cooperate? How are the conflicts that emerge resolved? Observe that conflicts based on power struggles in situations such as these seem unavoidable in family life. In today's Gospel, Jesus teaches how Christians are to show their authority over others. Read together today's Gospel, Mark 10:35-45. After reading the Gospel, talk with your family about Jesus' unique message to his disciples about how they are to exercise authority. Talk about ways in which you might apply Jesus' words in your family life. Conclude by praying we may receive honor in God's eyes by learning to serve others in love. Pray together the Peace Prayer of Saint Francis.

Fr. Al’s Ramblings... The Roman Catholic Funeral Rite Clarified

The Catholic Funeral Liturgy is divided into three distinct parts, each with its own purpose. For that reason, we highly recommend following the complete structure and making use of each liturgical “moment” offered to a family.

First part of the funeral service is called: the Wake or Visitation. Generally, a Service of the Word, with sacred scripture readings, accompanied by prayer, reflection, time for recalling the life of the deceased, and possibly a rosary. This period is usually followed by mourners processing by the casket to offer individual respect to the memory of the deceased.

Second: The funeral liturgy outside Holy Mass or within Holy Mass. This step is the central celebration of the family, friends, and the Christian community ideally the Funeral Mass is celebrated as part of Holy Mass although when Mass cannot be celebrated, a Funeral liturgy Outside of Mass can take place.

Third: The Burial Rite or Interment: Ideally, a baptized person is buried in a Catholic cemetery, or parish cemetery or columbarium. A Catholic may be buried in a non- Catholic cemetery, when the ground is blessed for burial.

The Vigil Service, Funeral Mass & Burial

When a deceased person is identified as Catholic, funeral home directors should contact the parish office or pastor at the earliest possible convenience to determine the availability of the church, an appropriate minister (priest for Mass, priest, deacon, or others for Vigil Service) and the necessary parish staff, particularly the music director. The date, time, and minister must be confirmed before a commitment to the family is made. The Funeral Vigil assists a family to begin the mourning process by gathering for a Service of the Word with features of prayer, remembrance, story-telling. A Vigil Service is to be held in a funeral home, or a suitable location of sufficient size to accommodate the needs of the service. Where extraordinary circumstances require, the church (in consultation with the Pastor), may be substituted for the funeral home.

The Funeral Mass must be held in a church or approved chapel (such as a chapel in a Catholic cemetery). Typically, the parish church is the site for a Funeral Mass. The Funeral Mass is the central liturgical celebration for the deceased, and this Eucharistic celebration must be carried out in a sacred place. Circumstances may allow for a Funeral Liturgy Outside of Mass when a Catholic dies, especially if there are no other Catholic friends or relatives of the deceased. Recall, though, that the parish family may be the primary support for the deceased. In that case, a parish Funeral Mass is warranted. Planning a Catholic Funeral Mass with a family is a gift of pastoral care. The parish should use its fullest resources to welcome and support a family in this difficult time. Regardless of the number of mourners expected, the Funeral Vigil, Funeral Mass, and Committal services should be offered. This raises awareness that mourners can express their sorrow, begin the initial adjustment to loss, and possibly experience gradual reconciliation.

Burial of the body of the deceased should be in a sacred place, but the Church does not mandate a Catholic cemetery although this is the preference. The body or the remains may be interred either in a grave or entombed in a mausoleum or columbarium.

In the Diocese of Springfield in Illinois, the Funeral Mass must be celebrated in a properly designated parish church, parish chapel, or another sacred Catholic chapel or oratory. No permission is granted for the Funeral Mass to be celebrated in a funeral home or funeral home chapel. A mausoleum chapel at a Catholic cemetery is considered to be a viable alternative to a parish church. The funerals of Catholics are governed by regulations contained within the Order of Christian Funerals (OCF) and Canon Law.
