Family Connection John 18:33b-37

Understanding today's feast of Christ the King may be particularly challenging. While most of us do not have direct experience with kings or royalty, we have a sense of who they are. We know that royalty have sovereignty over their kingdoms. We know that those who are subjects to royalty offer them allegiance and honor. To understand how Christ is our king, we extend and magnify what we know to be true of the best of human royalty. Christ's kingship extends to all places, all people, and all times. Christ manifests his kingship through his death on the cross in which he offered salvation to everyone. Those who can see with eyes of faith recognize Jesus to be our heavenly king.

As you gather as a family, recall that this Sunday is the last Sunday in the Church year and on this Sunday we celebrate the feast of Christ the King. Talk together about what it means to be a king or queen. How do those who are subjects behave toward royalty? Invite children to role-play what one does in the presence of royalty. Read today's Gospel, John 18:33b-37. Ask your family to discuss these questions: Does Pilate treat Jesus like royalty? (No.) What does Jesus say about his kingdom? (It is not of this world.) Talk about how your family shows honor and obedience to Christ our King. Pray together the Lord's Prayer and ask God to help your family act in ways that show you recognize and honor Christ as King.

Fr. Al's Ramblings...

November is the month we Catholics began to focus on reconciliation and the beginning of the Advent Season. We do this as part of our preparation for Christmas. Therefore, I have chosen to write on the two kinds of punishment attached to sin; eternal and temporal.

Eternal punishment for sin is that punishment which is everlasting. Without end. Thus, eternal. That is the punishment due to mortal sin.

Temporal punishment for sin is a punishment which will have a definite end, when the soul is purified and is permitted into heaven. Thus temporary. Temporal punishment for sin is that which is experienced in Purgatory.

Eternal punishment is due to un-repented mortal sin. A person who commits a mortal sin, essentially cuts himself off from the grace of God. If he persists in this condition without repenting, until he dies, then he has essentially cut himself off from the grace of God, for eternity.

The Catechism says:

1035 The teaching of the Church affirms the existence of hell and its eternity. Immediately after death the souls of those who die in a state of mortal sin descend into hell, where they suffer the punishments of hell, "eternal fire." The chief punishment of hell is eternal separation from God, in whom alone man can possess the life and happiness for which he was created and for which he longs.

A good illustration of this is neglecting the Mass. The Catholic Church teaches that one needs to attend the Mass every Sunday, on pain of mortal sin. The Mass is where Catholics gather to worship God and remember Christ's sacrifice. If we place such a low value upon the worship of God and the sacrifice of His Son for our salvation, that we miss it whenever there is a football game or whenever we want to get a new hairdo, then we have cut ourselves off from the grace of God.

If we persist in this way, until we die, without repenting that we have neglected the Mass, we will merit eternal punishment. See Hebrews 10:25-30.

Temporal punishment, on the other hand, can be remitted. If you repent and go to Confession, then God forgives the sin and the eternal punishment. Depending upon the intensity of your repentance and upon your behavior the rest of your life, that determines whether you will have to suffer any temporary punishments in Purgatory. Why purgatory, because, in order to purify the soul. most of us will die in an imperfect state of grace. God, in His mercy, will cleanse us of the imperfections so that we can enter heaven to receive our eternal reward. So some will not endure any punishments in the afterlife. Some people in this world will suffer enough to cleanse them of all their sins before they die. These are exceptional and heroic people, who dedicate themselves to God and to the love of their fellow man. This is actually the goal that we should all aim to achieve.

Scripture says in 1 Peter 4:1; Forasmuch then as Christ hath suffered for us in the flesh, arm yourselves likewise with the same mind: for he that has suffered in the flesh has ceased from sin.
