### Family Connection- John 15:1-8

Jesus teaches that he is the vine and that his disciples are the branches.

The goal of our life of prayer is to increase our awareness that Jesus lives with us always. Prayer is more than a dialogue with God; prayer is a lifting of our minds and hearts to God so that God might dwell and act within us and through us. The pinnacle of our life of prayer is our communion with Jesus in the Eucharist. Through this sacrament, we receive Jesus himself, and he remains with us. Our life of prayer and our union with Jesus will lead us to fruitful service to others.

Place a plant in your gathering space. Invite everyone to look at the plant, noting the connection between the plant and its leaves. Talk about the integral connection between all the

parts of a healthy plant. Introduce today's Gospel by saying that Jesus talked about his relationship to his disciples using this metaphor. Read today's Gospel, John 15:1-8. Talk about the ways in which we are invited to relate to Jesus as his disciples today—prayer, Scripture, the Eucharist, and so on. When we do these things, Jesus promises to remain with us and to lead us to serve others well. Pray together that we will continue to be attentive and open to Jesus as he works in our lives today. Pray together the Acts of Faith, Hope, and Love.

# Fr. Al's Ramblings

My favorite month, May, the month of our Mother! Why do we set aside this month to honor and venerate our mothers? For me the answer is very simple. All our mothers are a beautiful gift from God, and what makes our mothers such a gift? They influence our entire lives? They offer compassion, unconditional love, patience, joy, surrender, self-sacrifice – these are just a few attributes that mothers demonstrate. Hopefully, most of us have noticed these qualities in our mothers. In our modern culture, however, many mothers do not receive the honor and credit they deserve. Motherhood itself is even found suspect by women who put a career or pleasure first. There is no question that motherhood demands tremendous sacrifices. The many mothers who undertake to raise their children alone, without the support of the father of their children, are an example of this. True motherhood requires what we all desire deep down: courage, dedication, selflessness, and the fulfillment and joy that naturally follow. This is what we honor in our mothers. I mention these attributes because my own mother was challenged at a very young age to assume the role as provider and caregiver for her only sister, my beloved aunt, and then to go on and raise thirteen children the last seven without my father I truly believe, she was the ideal mother as described in the aforementioned qualities. It was her strong faith (a convert to Catholicism) in God and dedication to the Blessed Mother Mary.

So, let us all reflect upon and give thanks to our mothers not only on Mother's Day but every day! As Catholic Christians we are so blessed with a Spiritual mother, Mary, the mother of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Since the Council of Nicea in 787, the Church has asserted that it is lawful to venerate images of Christ, Mary and the saints. This is an ancient practice of the Christian churches in both the East and in the West. As the official liturgical Order of Crowning an Image of the Blessed Virgin Mary [published in 1987 by the United States Catholic Conference] states: Coronation is one form of reverence frequently shown to images of the Blessed Virgin Mary. ... It is especially from the end of the sixteenth century that in the West the practice became widespread for the faithful, both religious and laity, to crown images of the Blessed Virgin. The popes not only endorsed this devout custom but "on many occasions, either personally or through bishop-delegates, carried out the coronation of Marian images."

Honoring the Mother of God during Easter is the foundation of our devotion to Mary during May. With the flowers of spring, we crown Mary the Queen of Heaven.

Statues and other iconographic images can be "windows into heaven". The crowning of sacred images with herbs and flowers is an ancient tradition. The crowns call to mind the victory wreaths that await the baptized in the fullness of time. All God's children are called to accept their responsibilities as the royal heirs to the throne of heaven.

The U.S. bishop's state: The queen symbol was attributed to Mary because she was a perfect follower of Christ, who is the absolute "crown" of creation. She is the Mother of the Son of God, who is the messianic King. Mary is the Mother of Christ, the Word Incarnate... "he will be great and will be called Son of the Most High; the Lord will give him the throne of his father David; and he will reign over the house of Jacob forever; and of his kingdom there will be no end" (Lk 1:32-33). Elizabeth greeted the Blessed Virgin, pregnant with Jesus, as "the mother of my Lord" (Lk 1:41-43). Mary is the perfect follower of Christ. The maid of Nazareth consented to God's plan; she journeyed on the pilgrimage of faith; she listened to God's Word and kept it in her heart; she remained steadfastly in close union with her Son, all the way to the foot of the Cross; she persevered in prayer with the Church. Thus, in an eminent way she won the "crown of righteousness" (2 Tim 4:8), the "crown of life" (Jas 1:12; Rev 2:10), the "crown of glory" (1 Pet 5:4) that is promised to those who follow Christ. ("Order of Crowning," NCCB, 1987)
