

Thoughts from Fr. Adam

As we begin August, that means we are coming nearer to the beginning of the school year. And I realize that in many households, that is not a welcome truth to some family members. To be fair, when I was growing up, I had conflicting feelings toward school: I loved learning...at least learning things that I was interested in, classes that I wasn't interested in, well it showed in my effort and grades. Many of the teachers that I had, even when I wasn't the best student in their class were still kind and encouraging to me. As for fitting in at school? Well, that was much more difficult. So, for those that love to learn? I'm there with you. Those that have a difficult time and have anxiety about it? I'm also there with you.

One of the questions that is commonly posed in classes by students is "when am I going to use this in everyday life?" And some people may think the same about Theology. Theology is typically thought of as a class or series of classes, whether it's in Catholic Schools or Faith Formation. Some people view it as a purely academic pursuit. After all, at its root, "theology" means "study of God."

However, when we study, when we learn about God, that influences us, or it should. When we learn that God is not some manipulative, vicious, vengeful being, but is instead a loving, merciful, just Father, we're going to go from fear of punishment and retribution to not wanting to disappoint Him, a desire to do His Will because He wants the best for us. We go from saying, "I can't believe a loving God would send people to Hell" to realizing that God does not force us to choose Him. And if someone persists in deliberately not choosing God, even at the time of their death, God is not going to force them to be in Heaven with Him. Because if God forced them to be in Heaven, when that person did not want to be with God, that would not be love at all. That, in some words, would be kidnapping.

When we study, when we learn about God, and we know that Jesus Christ came so that we may be freed from sin and death, that we might have new life. How do we live our life in a manner that reflects that? When we read the Gospels and Jesus calls people to repentance, when He calls people to serve the poor, clothe the naked, feed the hungry, and shelter the homeless, how do we live in a manner that reflects that? Do we say to ourselves, "well, that's what the Church is for" or do we say, "as a member of the Church, as a member of the Body of Christ, how am I called to serve Jesus in this moment?" Because these calls to repentance and service are not just directed to the people who were alive in the early 1st Century AD, they are directed to each disciple of Christ from then until now and into the future until the end of the world: from Jerusalem to Rome to Green Creek to Shumway to Guatemala to Australia. The more we know about God, the more our life is transformed. What motivates our lives? What influences our actions? Is it our faith? Or is it something else?

Dear Padre,

Sometimes after Mass, I go to the late service at a "Bible church" with the rest of my family. Once a month, this church serves communion, but they make it clear that it is only as a memory of Jesus and the Last Supper, and that Jesus is not present at communion. Is it OK to receive this communion?



The Catholic understanding of Holy Communion includes not only the understanding of Communion as the Body and Blood of Christ, but it includes something more. Communion is a statement of belief and a statement of belonging. When Catholics participate in the sacrament, they are identifying with divinity as well as with the community of believers who are joined together in "one mind and in one spirit." It is an act of unity, a real "communion." Even though the Bible church clearly teaches a different theology of communion, it would seem to me that, for a Catholic, the fullest meaning and understanding of Communion is important and worth witnessing to. For this reason, I would refrain from participating in communion at the Bible church. Do so quietly and respectfully, because what is being celebrated is important; it just does not have the full meaning that you understand is necessary.
