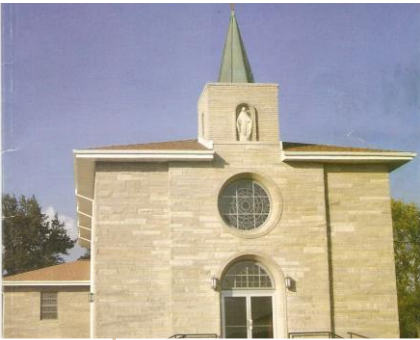

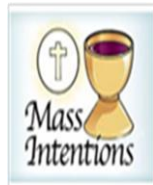
They do have pantry dates in Oct if you can help

Fr. Adam and Jesse Davis are offering OCIA this year. What is the OCIA? The Order of Christian Initiation of Adults (OCIA) is designed for non-Catholics who wish to learn more about the Catholic Church.

The OCIA process explores the meaning of faith and how Catholics express that faith in the community and in the world. It offers a chance to ask questions, raise doubts, acquire information, share, learn and grow. What’s the commitment? First of all, you’re not making a commitment to join the Catholic Church. You won’t be pressured into making any decisions; you can stop attending the meetings at any time. You will continue to be welcome at the meetings and in the parish no matter what your decision.

You might want to share this information about the OCIA with anyone to whom you wish to offer an invitation. Perhaps to give them support and encouragement, you might offer to accompany them to one of the meetings.

One of my friends, sometime last month, asked me if we were living in Purgatory and if not, could I explain why I would say that we’re not. I said to her that we are not living in Purgatory, because Purgatory is there so that we may be purified in order to enter into the presence of God. Purification isn’t always pleasant, but it is for our good. I compared it to her preparation for her job: the schooling necessary for her job, the on the job training for her job was certainly not always pleasant, but it was worth it in order to do her job and be good at it. And I was safe in this because while her job is difficult and challenging at times, I know she loves her job. And, while at some point, all analogies fall apart, we can liken that to Purgatory: if we enter into the state of Purgatory, we know that our destination is Heaven. And why is Purgatory a good thing? If we believe that only perfection can exist in Heaven, can exist in that presence of God, and we examine the lives of others, or perhaps even ourselves, we can, perhaps acknowledge, that almost 100% of people very likely aren’t in a state of perfection when they die. . God didn’t just give us the promise of new life, just so we could be stopped at the gates of Heaven because we haven’t been completely purified, leaving us just to exist in an in between state. He has established the avenues so that we may be in His presence forever.

Another aspect that I shared is that, again, as Purgatory is preparation to enter the presence of God, the purification that happens there is only for our good. If we were living in Purgatory, if Earth was Purgatory, the tragic, evil, and hateful things that have taken place throughout history wouldn’t have happened. Political and social commentators wouldn’t be assassinated, school shootings wouldn’t happen, terrorist attacks, genocides, ethnic and racial cleansings, intentionally driving others into suicidal feelings or actions, anything immoral, etc., etc., etc, none of that would happen. No one can convince me that any of these things are for the good and intended to purify our souls. Now, I also believe that God can and does accompany us through these events, that we are able to come to a greater appreciation and understanding of the dignity of each and every person, that we can grow in understanding of how, in everything, we’re called to cling to Jesus more and more. And as much as we can look at atrocities and tragedies, I also believe that we are not in Hell. While we acknowledge, and don’t ignore atrocities, tragedies, and injustices, we are not to ignore the beauty and good that there is in this world. People serving one another: those who are sick, imprisoned, and neglected. The beauty of nature and creation. The joy of family and friends sharing a meal and time together, setting aside differences and disagreements and just enjoying one another’s company. Coming together in prayer and worship, and sharing in partaking the Eucharist. There are terrible things that happen, but there are also great, beautiful and wonderful things. We are not in Purgatory, but we are not in Hell. We are on Earth. We need acknowledge the terrible and confront it with hope, with Jesus Christ, and pointing to Him as the source of true peace, love, and truth.

One or both persons must be registered and actively living their faith. All couples planning to be married at our parish must attend a Pre-Cana program, Natural Family Planning program and FOCCUS evaluation.

Sacrament of Baptism - A family must be registered & actively living their faith. Godparents must also be registered in a Catholic parish or other Christian church & actively living their faith. Dear Padre,

A Protestant friend tells me that Jesus died to take the punishment for our sins. That doesn't seem accurate to me. What does the Church teach about the meaning of Jesus' death on the cross?

Jesus understood his mission to be sacrificing his own life "as a ransom for many" (Matthew 20:28). His fidelity to that mission was even at the cost of death. However, saying Jesus' death was payment for our sins doesn't mean that a vengeful God was appeased by the slaughter of his own innocent son. Rather, we are redeemed because of the mutual love between Father and Son, as well as the love Christ had for us all when he offered his life. "It is love 'to the end' (see John 13:1) that confers on Christ's sacrifice its value as redemption and reparation, as atonement and satisfaction" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 616). It is in this sense that Jesus' death was a payment—not one to be exacted—but a unique sacrifice "that completes and surpasses all other sacrifices," when "the Father handed his Son over to sinners in order to reconcile us with himself," and the Son of God freely and lovingly offered his human life to his Father "in reparation for our disobedience" (CCC 614). Christ "bore our sins in his body upon the cross.... By his wounds you have been healed" (1 Peter 2:24). Viewed in light of the resurrection, Christ's death has meaning in eternal life's triumph over sin. ●

When Life Is on Empty

As he stood in line in front of me, the back of his T-shirt read, "Pain is weakness leaving the body." Though unsaid, it

implied that the parting pain would be replaced by newfound strength. Yet, the more I thought about it, I wondered if that is always the case. Some pain simply leaves one empty, like the grief that comes with the death of one's child. That emptiness never leaves, it is never replaced. So too, the pain of living with mental illness, as it seems to isolate one from many of life's joys and satisfactions. Or, eventually, the aging process in all of us, as it slips in and steals the treasures of life, one by one. Pain is not always weakness leaving the body. Sometimes, it is the pain of an alien spirit settling in for the long haul.

If St. Paul's assertion that Jesus came and "emptied himself...coming in human likeness...even [to] death on a cross," then those times that seem to empty us of all we would hold dear are the times when we slowly take on the image of Jesus in our own lives. It is at such times when we are most powerless but also when God's spirit shines through our broken and wounded lives, if only because we become totally dependent upon God. It is Saint Teresa of Kolkata who is said to have once remarked that even God cannot fill what is already full. ●
