October 19, 2025 The Power of Persistent Prayer

On the 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C, the Gospel highlights the power of persistent prayer through the parable of the persistent widow. This story teaches us that even when we



feel like our prayers are unanswered, we should continue to pray and trust in God's timing. The widow's determination in asking the unjust judge for justice is a powerful example of how we should approach prayer with persistence and faith.

The early Christians believed that the "Day of the Lord" would come soon, ending their struggles under Roman rule. This expectation, rooted in Jewish tradition, anticipated a new world led by a king from the line of David. Jesus, however, teaches that this new world requires patience and trust in God's timing. The persistent widow's actions remind us that we should not lose heart when answers to our prayers are delayed.

Sometimes, we may feel discouraged when our prayers seem unanswered. It can be tempting to think that God is not listening. However, the Gospel reassures us that God hears every prayer, even if the response is not immediate. Like the widow, we must continue to pray and trust that God will bring about justice and peace in His perfect time.

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This weekend, we hear the message in the scriptures to trust in God. We see a few different ways we need to trust God. First, from Exodus 17:8-13, we need to trust God as our guardian and helper, our defender. Next, in St. Paul's second letter to Timothy, we are reminded that God's word is true, and we are to put our trust in what God has revealed to us in Sacred Scripture. Likewise, we hear from the gospel of Luke, Jesus is teaching the importance of prayer and to trust that God will hear our prayers and answer them.

Trust, this is one area that is hard for us to really do, mainly because when we trust another person, we are open and very vulnerable to being hurt. We've heard the saying that trust is earned, not just given, and that trust has to be built and is easily broken. I think that our experiences of trusting others in our relationships that end broken and cause us to hurt can be a hindrance to our ability to trust in God and build our relationship with him. God knows this, and he has continued to reassure us throughout history that we can trust him. Another stumbling block for us to trust is "control". We sometimes find it hard to let go of our control of a situation and to trust that God has a plan for us.

Building trust is relational, and it's precisely why Jesus points us to prayer. Prayer is a conversation with God. And it's through this continued conversation that we build a relationship and, in turn, can trust God.

As we reflect on these scripture readings this weekend, we should ask ourselves, "Do I fully trust God?" If not, what am I holding on to that is preventing me from that trust? And how is my prayer life? Do I speak to God regularly and let God speak to me? If I don't, what is keeping me from building a better relationship with God?

Please know of my prayers for you all.

The First Reading highlights the importance of community support in our spiritual journey. In this reading, Moses needed help to keep his hands raised in prayer, and Aaron and Hur supported him. This story shows that we cannot sustain our faith alone; we need the support and encouragement of others in our community.

When we face difficulties or feel tired in our spiritual lives, it is important to lean on our faith community. Just as Aaron and Hur helped Moses, our friends and family can help us stay strong in faith. Being part of a community offers support, encouragement, and accountability, which are essential in maintaining our spiritual growth and perseverance.

Patience is another key theme in these readings. Often, we want quick solutions, especially when facing injustice or suffering. However, God's timing is different from ours. We are called to trust that God is at work, even if we cannot see immediate results. This trust requires patience and faith, knowing that God's plans are for our good.

Scripture, Action, and Hope

The Second Reading from 2 Timothy emphasizes the role of scripture in guiding our lives. Scripture is described as useful for teaching, correcting, and training in righteousness.
