


What do you do in times of trials? This Sunday's Gospel from Luke, Jesus tells his disciples of many trials that they will see and undergo themselves, unlike the Book of Revelation, which talks about the end of the world. In this passage in Luke, Jesus is talking about the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem, which was the center of worship for the Jews. Naturally, the question comes, "When will this happen?" Jesus is asked to predict for his followers the time when this will occur, and better yet, tell us the signs that will happen before this takes place. It's in our human nature, I think, to want to know these sorts of things. It gives us a sense of security and power to think that if we know, we can prevent it or avoid it altogether.

Jesus' message through all of this is that of Hope and Trust. Jesus reveals these things to us not so we can be prepared so as to control them, but rather so that we can recognize them and not lose our Peace. Jesus says, "Remember, you are not to prepare your defense beforehand, for I myself shall give you a wisdom in speaking that all your adversaries will be powerless to resist or refute." It's trust in Jesus that will see us through the many trials that we face in life.

St. Paul, in his letter to the Thessalonians, urges them to imitate him and his companions in how they live and work, and to continue the work at hand. We need to remember our mission to further the Kingdom of God here on earth, through evangelization, corporal and spiritual works of mercy, and spreading the good news of redemption through Jesus Christ.

We need not worry and dwell on our trials as an end or as our destruction, but rather something Jesus told us would come, and he will give us power to overcome. We must stay the course, for Jesus tells us, "By your perseverance you will secure your lives."

Dear Padre November 16, 2025

Is it a sin to swear if I'm not taking the Lord's name in vain?

As hard as it might be to comprehend, not every bad habit is a sin. Human weakness is sometimes nothing more than human weakness. An exclamation of anger or frustration is often nothing more than an expression of how you feel. When we assign "sin" to every human action or imperfection, we trivialize sin. When we see sin around every corner and in every possible human interaction, we might very well become numb to the presence of real sin when it occurs. The possibility of sin is a wonderful motivator to help us adjust our choices and change our behaviors, but it need not be the only option. Monitor your speech because you want to be a good person, a mature person, a caring person. That is a virtuous reason and worth the effort. At the same time, remain vigilant, as any good person who desires to be in relationship with the Lord, and choose behaviors that model a good Christian life. Examine your choices and decisions, and when you recognize the presence of sin, be willing to acknowledge that it is sinful, confess it, and then graciously accept the forgiveness and mercy of the Lord. •




Saint Elizabeth of Hungary Feast Day: November 17
