He has the power to calm our fears and guide us through difficult times. This psalm also encourages us to recognize God’s presence in the world around us. When we see the beauty of nature, we can remember that it reflects God’s strength. His voice still speaks to us through creation, reminding us of His care for everything He has made. Finally, Psalm 29 invites us to seek peace from God. In a world full of stress and conflict, we can turn to God for the peace that only He can give. By trusting in His power and love, we can find the strength to face our problems and the peace to keep going.

One of the things that has seemed to grow throughout the years, particularly with the increase of social media, is the desire to claim that the timing of Liturgical celebrations, such as Christmas and Easter didn't actually happen at the time that we celebrate them. Instead, the claim is made, that Christians, at a some later date, appropriated December 25th, as well as the celebration of Easter, from pagan religions in order to divert people toward Christianity and away from their original religions. And of course, these posts are meant to undermine belief, and portray Christianity as an illegitimate, a false religion. It's also meant to plant and cultivate the seed of doubt within Christians, to say, "if your religious leaders are willing to lie and hide the truth about that, what else are they lying to you about?"

First, let's tackle Easter, which is actually a word from German. English developed out of a combination of German, French, and Latin (through French influences), with influences from a smattering of other languages. The Latin and Greek term for Easter is "Pascha", which is taken from the Hebrew term "pesach" or "Passover." The word Easter was only associated with the celebration of the Resurrection several centuries after the event and our celebrating it. So, this claim about Christians appropriating the term "Easter" and taking it from pagans is quite easily debunked.

As for the claim about the birth of Jesus "probably not even happening in December, let alone December 25th", also stealing that from pagan religions, can also be debunked, although we need to have a little more familiarity with the historical context leading up to the birth of Jesus. Thankfully, though, the writers of the Gospels, particularly Matthew, Mark, and Luke, were very attentive to their recent history. They document the political leaders of the time; they give us the fact that the angel of the Lord appeared to Zechariah in the temple, in the Holy of Holies, which had a specific rotation attached to the calendar, and they give us context clues about shepherds watching by night, the fact that Mary and Joseph went to Bethlehem for the census, and there are non-Scriptural accounts for when the census was initiated. So, this claim too can be addressed.

And while we don't read and delve into Scripture for the purpose of proving people wrong or being able to argue with people, when questions about "why do Catholics believe this" or claims that make the argument that Christianity is actually just a lie and has no basis in truth, being familiar with the Bible is helpful. So, what's the purpose of reading the Bible then? It helps us to grow in knowledge of God, drawing us deeper into a loving relationship with the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, and guides us to a deeper love for our neighbor.

Dear Padre January 11, 2026

Why do our bishops not marry? Scripture plainly says that they must be the husband of one wife and have faithful children.

This is an excellent question and brings us face to face with an important truth: for Catholics, the sacred Scripture is not the singular source of our practice and discipline. We also look, with equal authority, to the living Tradition of the Church. The magisterium is entrusted with the authentic interpretation of both Scripture and Tradition.

With this theological and historical context as a necessary background to your question, the answer to your query is this: the lived Tradition of the Church does not support a married clergy, including bishops. Although the Scripture allows for it, and provides some general guidelines, the lived Tradition of the Church does not. The Roman Catholic Church has a celibate clergy and will continue to have a celibate clergy unless and until the magisterium, in union with the pope, determines otherwise. There have been some discussions about changing this discipline, but now there is not much momentum that would suggest any imminent change.

In the wider Orthodox Catholic Church, in union with Rome, there is a provision for a married clergy, but, even in these traditions, there is no exception made for married bishops. Bishops are and will continue to be celibate regardless of what Scripture may allow. ●Fr. Thomas M. Santa, CSsR / DearPadre.org

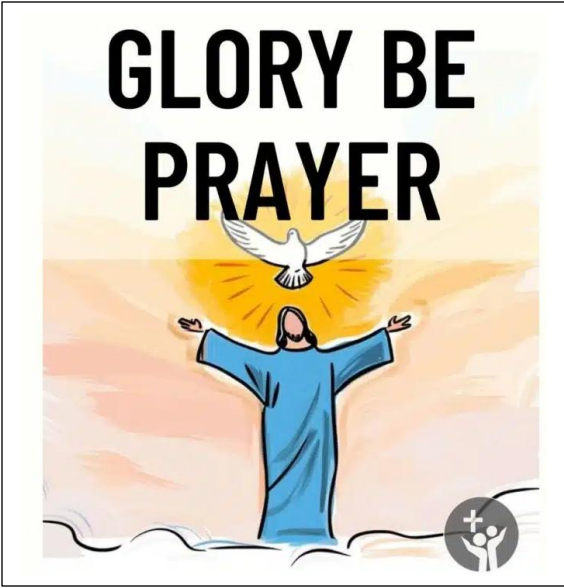
The Glory Be is a short and simple prayer. Catholics use it often in both private and public prayer. It gives praise to God the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. This prayer is a way to show love and honor to the Holy Trinity.

You will hear this prayer during the Rosary, in the Liturgy of the Hours, and at many other times in Catholic life. Many people use it at the beginning or end of prayer. It reminds us who God is and helps us focus our minds and hearts on Him.

The Glory Be is a reminder that God is with us in every moment. It tells us that God was there at the beginning, is with us now, and will always be. These words help bring peace and trust, especially during hard times. The prayer is short, but it says a lot about our faith.

This prayer also connects us to the whole Church. Catholics around the world pray these same words. When we say the Glory Be, we join in the prayer of the Church across time and space. It helps us stay close to God and to each other.

The Glory Be is one of the oldest prayers in the Church. Christians have been praying it for many centuries. It is sometimes called the “Doxology,” which means a short prayer that gives glory to God. Early Christians used this type of prayer when they gathered to worship, especially when reading from Scripture or singing psalms.
