St. Anselm's Prayer

O my God teach my heart where and how to seek you, where and how to find you...You are my God and you are my All and I have never seen you. You have made me and remade me, you have bestowed on me all the good things I possess, Still I do not know you...

I have not yet done that for which I was made....Teach me to seek you... I cannot seek you unless you teach me or find you unless you show yourself to me. Let me seek you in my desire, let me desire you in my seeking. Let me find you by loving you, let me love you when I find you.

This prayer, invoking the spirit of Epiphany, seeks divine guidance in understanding and aligning with God's desires. It expresses a deep yearning to know and find God, acknowledging that despite God's gifts and creation, the seeker has yet to truly understand their purpose. The prayer, attributed to St. Anselm, reflects on the human inability to seek or find God without divine intervention. It pleads for God to teach the heart to seek and find Him, emphasizing the desire to know God more deeply. The prayer connects with the Epiphany theme of seeking and discovering Christ, aspiring to bring gifts – not just physical, but of the heart and spirit – that are in harmony with God's will.



One of the misconceptions about Catholics is that the Church doesn't want the faithful to read the Bible. That can come from a time when the Scriptures were fastened through the ambos. However, the fastening of Scriptures was not because the Church didn't want Catholics to know and understand the Bible; it was because, during that period of time, books (of any kind) were incredibly valuable, particularly before printing presses were common, and were at risk of being stolen and sold. It would be very expensive to replace the Scriptures used for Mass. Also, the ability to read and right wasn't incredibly widespread; literacy wasn't even highly prioritized among the nobility, typically they had multiple people in their services to read and write for them. And this is why stained glass in churches became so important, in a set order, so that people would be able to understand the sequence of events in the Bible, and so they could understand it for themselves.

Another avenue that the misconception about the Church not wanting the faithful to read the Bible can come from the fact that, in many aspects, we have the authority of Church teaching to help us understand the Bible. Some people may believe that we should just interpret the Scriptures for ourselves, and all reasonable people of faith should be able to come to a universal agreement on what is meant in a particular passage or Book in the Bible. Well, if that were the case, there wouldn't be nearly 200 major Protestant denominations or denominational categories in the United States alone. That's not to dunk on our brothers and sisters in Christ, it's just to say, a universal understanding of how to understand the Bible needs an authority other than just myself, an individual. And even when we have the authority of the Church, there are disagreements or quibbles about how to interpret certain passages. But one more thing about understanding the Scriptures: Jesus taught His disciples along the way to Emmaus beginning with Moses and the Prophets what was said in the Scriptures concerning Himself (Luke 24:25-27).

That doesn't mean there's secret knowledge about Scripture, about Jesus Himself. No seminarian or member of the clergy is taught from a secret book that the faithful don't have access to. We read the same Bible. Yes, we also read Commentaries on Scripture, and history and methods of interpretation and understanding. However, especially at a time of widespread literacy, anyone can access those works and grow in understanding. And that's a good thing! Because the more we learn about Scripture, and the context and the history that is found in the Bible and in archeology, the more we're able to realize God's great love for us. That is beautiful. Whether you listen to The Bible in A Year with Fr. Mike Schmitz, or are involved with a Bible Study, or reflect on the readings for the weekdays or Sundays, or all of those things, the more we, everyone, clergy and parishioners alike, are familiar with the Bible, the more we can understand God's love for us, and what a gift that is.

Dear Padre January 4, 2026
I recently lost my husband of sixty years. I prayed for him through his four-year illness. Since he has died, I cannot pray. Any advice for me?

My heartfelt condolences on your profound loss. When someone we love dies, a part of us dies too. Sometimes, the trauma is so severe that it can even affect our relationship with God.

Psychiatrist Elisabeth Kübler-Ross identified five stages of grief. In the denial stage, some people can't accept the reality of the death. It becomes too much to handle. In the anger stage, some may question their belief in God—especially if their prayer requests (such as, "Please God, if you heal my loved one, I will...") weren't successful in the bargaining stage. People in the depression stage feel overwhelmed by the reality of the loss and may not always feel like connecting with others—even with God in prayer. However, in the acceptance stage, emotions stabilize, and a person comes to terms with their new reality. Nothing makes up for the absence of a loved one, but people manage to cope and live on.

It's because you loved so deeply that the loss feels so deep. God accepts you completely; God understands how you feel. He wants you to be at peace and live life fully. Our compassionate God yearns to help console you and offer assistance in your healing process until you can embrace him again in prayer.
